

Be Grass Fire Prepared

Although it's been very wet this year and cold lately, low rainfall and high winds over the last few weeks have led to dry grasslands across Windellama. After an increase in grass growth earlier this year, that long grass is now curing and becoming more fire prone. Your ground may be wet and possibly boggy but the tall grass is dry.

Grass fires can threaten quickly; even the most seasoned farmer can be caught out and a ute and water tank will be no match for the speed of a grass fire. It's important to remember grassfires are unpredictable, can start easily and spread quickly. The taller and drier the grass, the quicker and more intensely the fire will burn. Be sure to keep your grass short by mowing, grazing or slashing it back.

If you have conducted burning on your property, it's important to ensure you have fully extinguished any fire. Smouldering stumps can reignite and become fast-moving under the predicted winds for Windellama during July.

Here are simple things that you can do to reduce your risk:

- Create firebreaks and keep grass short you can mow it, graze it or slash it back
- Maintain your machinery and carry fire suppression equipment such as a 9L water fire extinguisher, a dry powder fire extinguisher or a 16L knapsack water spray pump.
- Know where you can move your animals to safety
- Check and maintain firefighting equipment like pumps and hoses
- Make sure a fire truck can access your property such as gates, trees or obstructions
- Think 4x4 for access clear 4 metres wide by 4 metres high



Planned burns

If you're planning to burn on your property, you need to Notify us of your planned burn - NSW Rural Fire Service. Notifying us of your planned burn can help reduce unnecessary emergency calls and you also need to let your neighbours know at least one day ahead and supervise the fire until it is out.



March 2023 Rainfall at our place.

I do hope you cleaned your gutters out because the extra 65.00mm received will come in handy. All up at our place we received 79.50mm.

April 2023 Rainfall at our place.

As of the 18th of this month we have only received 20mm at our place. Last year for April we received a total of 95.5mm. So once again, it's catch up time to get near 2022 rainfall for April.

Windellama Road Gardening

Last month I wrote about the variation of the ecology on different properties. One way was the planting of trees. When using trees when gardening they serve many purposes, for example,

- They can be used to create a wind break around your house and garden site.
- Flowering trees for attracting birds or just for the flowers.
- Fruit trees for the sometimes bounty they produce.
- A sacrificial fruit tree to attract birds, other winged varmints and 4 legged pests away from your orchid.
- Shade for you and also your animals.
- For fodder during drought.
- Grown for timber building and other property uses like fence posts.
- When they fall over, fire wood!

From my experience trees will definitely change the ecology where they are grown and in most cases for the better.

Trees change the ecology where thy grow by attracting birds, animals and insects that shed their body waste or their carcase when they die. This waste will eventually will drop under the tree and combined with the leaves and branches drop, also contributes to improving the soil surrounding the tree. This fact alone will add microbes and other goodies to the soil and thus combined, helps in changing the locations of the tree ecology.

When planting a tree think about where it is to be planted, especially, under power wires or near septic trenches, drainage pipes or to close to fences and cement slabs.

Just as the planting of a tree can change the ecology where planted, you can also change the ecology where your garden is to go using similar products as with what happens when a tree is planted. Changes can be made by adding compost, manures, mulch, minerals and chemically made fertilisers.

There are many options in creating a garden. For example, in or on the existing soil, establishing wicking beds or buckets, and pots of different sizes. You can also use a combination of these examples.

At our place we now use no dig gardens created on the soil that exists.

Jobs for the month at our place

The fruit trees have had their summer cut back and now I wait to mid winter when the trees are bare for their final prune.

The winter beds have been completed with extras in the form of netting to keep out pests and soaker hoses installed.

Old wet hay is being loosely placed under our fruit trees with a little blood and bone combined with it.

<u>Chooks</u>: Our chooks lost their feathers quickly, and my naked ladies were quite bare. To assist them through the moult I gave them extra protein the form of oil seeds like Sunflower. It's worked as they are feathering up quickly.

Windellama SES First Aid & CFR

On 18th of March at approximately 1900 hrs I was requested (as a member of Windellama S.E.S.) to assist paramedics with the rescue of an injured bushwalker at Bungonia. On arrival our team were advised that there were now 3 concurrent search and rescue operations underway.

The days temperature had been over 30 C, a cut off point for safe hiking in the canyons and gorge.

A member of the cave rescue group found an injured solo hiker in Slot Canyon and raised the initial emergency response. A group of experienced hikers then raised the alarm for a group including 4 children who had descended into the Shoalhaven Gorge. (despite specific warnings from the hiking group).

The hiking group assisted half of the Shoalhaven group up the Lookdown ridge. Earlier a Canberra rescue helicopter had winched a paramedic and equipment into the Slot Canyon.

Meanwhile the cave rescue member led police rescue and paramedics into the canyon to extract the injured walker. Following this rescue the police rescue then proceeded into the Shoalhaven Gorge to rescue the last 4 hikers. Meanwhile we assisted paramedics and cave rescue to return into Slot Canyon and bring out the helicopter paramedic and his equipment. Cave rescue were then going to do a fourth descent after dawn to retrieve personal equipment.

Groups assisting were cave rescue, Canberra helicopter & paramedic, Sydney paramedics, Crookwell & Goulburn ambulance crews, police rescue, Goulburn police, a hiking group and Windellama S.E.S.

Several people asked me where the national parks ranger was and were surprised to learn that the ranger station has been unmanned for many years.

Bungonia is an important recreational facility for people from Sydney & Canberra, but it must be treated with caution under changing weather conditions.

We, as usual, keep asking for more people to join our CFR Unit which operates under the State Emergency Service governance.

We help people in Windellama, Bungonia, Bungonia Heights, Tarago, Lower Boro, Stewarts' Crossing, Boro and Nerriga, as you can see, this encompasses a large area.

Our role is to treat patients prior to Ambulance arrival and to assist load patients to Ambulance or Helicopter, other Services also help in loading of patients, where necessary.

Roasting Coffee

Coffee beans need to be roasted to produce flavour and aroma. They must be kept moving in

the roaster throughout the entire process to keep them from burning.

Beans are roosted to between 205°C - 230°C. The longer a bean is roasted the more the heat pulls out the caffeine and the acidity. At higher temperatures there are visible oils on the beans and the sugars in the coffee beans caramelize. They have a richer flavour and fuller body. They also have the least acidity and caffeine of all coffee roasts. However, coffee beans are never roasted past 250°C because they will burn and become bitter.

Decaffeinated Coffee

Decaffeinated coffee is made from coffee beans that have had at least 97% of their caffeine removed.

There are many ways to remove caffeine from coffee beans. These include soaking in water, organic solvents or carbon dioxide. Raw coffee beans are moved in the solvent until the caffeine has been extracted from it, then the solvent is removed. The beans are then dried to 11% moisture and roasted in the usual way.

The taste and smell may become a little milder and the colour may change, depending on the method used. This can make decaffeinated coffee more pleasing to those who are sensitive to the bitter taste and smell of regular coffee.

Health benefits of drinking coffee

Coffee contains antioxidants including hydrocinnamic acids and polyphenols. These are very effective at neutralizing reactive compounds called free radicals. This reduces oxidative damage and may help prevent diseases like heart disease, cancer and type 2 diabetes.

Other benefits that have been attributed to drinking coffee (plain or decaffeinated) include improved mood, reaction time, memory and mental function, increased metabolic rate and fat burning, enhanced athletic performance and a lower risk of liver cirrhosis or end stage liver damage.

May in Your Garden



With the night cooling down, mildew which is a fungus, can be seen on leaves of dahlias, hydrangea, petunia, delphiniums, Easter daisy, pumpkins, zucchini etc., They have all come to end of summer growth. Delphiniums and Easter daisy can be cut back to about 8cm above the ground and with dahlias cut the stems above a leaf node. You can lift and store the dahlias bulbs in a dry warm place, if the winter is wet the bulbs can rot in the soil.(As mine did after all the wet seasons we had).

Do not place any leaves with mildew in the compost heap . Place in the garbage or burn if allowed.

This month many perennial plants such as polyanthus, Russell lupin and delphiniums can be divided making sure when you replant dig some compost into the garden as well as alight dressing of complete fertilizer.

Vegetables to sow are very limited as any seedlings planted now lay dormant during winter months.

VEGETABLES TO SOW NOW;- Broad beans, which like to grow in the cooler climate, before sowing give the bed a good dressing of garden lime.

Onion plants only white, they need very little water, plenty of sun, good drainage and before sowing a light dressing of complete fertilizer in the garden.

Flower seedlings that can be planted now include calendula, stocks (both tall and short), wallflower, alyssum, poppy, pansy, viola and verbena.

You can lift the gladioli bulbs, store them in a box or hang them up in an airy shed.

Take leaf cuttings of succulents, laying them flat and pressing them gently into pots filled with well-drained sandy potting m0ix.


Watch out for increased snail and slug activity as the weather cool, especially on strappy-leafed plants such as clivias.

Finish planting tulip bulbs in pots or garden, give them some fertilizer, or dig in some old compost.



Feed newly planted winter-and spring –blooming annuals every two weeks using liquid fertilizer and seaweed extract.

Group container plants together in cold-climate areas as they will help keep each other warm during the winter months, and in a sunny place.

For our April meeting, we journeyed out to Doug's place and then visited Jean's property nearby. Doug's property looked immaculate, as always, and the recent rain has picked it up so it looked its best for our meeting. We got a nice sunny day, although we could all feel the first signs of the cold weather



approaching, as the wind was quite brisk.

Doug has done a wonderful job of accenting his garden



with objects of interest, from a stone window sill out of Goulburn jail, complete with window bar recesses, to a collection of railway ironwork and other object d'art. They provide points of interest throughout the garden and nestle in beautifully with Doug's varied hedges and other plantings.

collection. Always interesting to see and hear about their varied histories.

We're meeting at Kevin's place in May, hopefully in time for his fig harvest. Kevin reminded us what good pollinators hover flies are, and gave us a detailed description of what hover fly larvae look like. He uncovered quite a few in his garden, which look just like fly maggots, but with a long tail. So if you come across some maggots in the garden, make sure that they aren't hover fly larvae if you intend

to dispatch them. These flies are really useful in the garden.

In other gardens, Harry has started building his glasshouse, using recycled glass doors. Judy is harvesting lots of zucchinis, with a liberal sprinkling of "baseball bats" as they have been on holidays and the zucchinis took off in their absence. Irene is harvesting loads of purple beans, and Warren gave us some tips on planting gladioli bulbs, recommending that we soak the bulbs in Condy's crystals before planting to get rid of the pests.

We also noted that mice and rats are on the increase again, so we need to be vigilant with our stored bulbs and tubers as well as keeping a good eye out in our vehicles. They do appear to appreciate the warmth of the engine and use car upholstery to make their nests. They seem to love to chew on something expensive. Although many of us lay baits around our vehicles, it was recommended that we try eucalyptus or peppermint oil to deter the little rodents. Evidently they keep well away from the smell and it has the added bonus of being cheap and not injurious to native wildlife like lizards.

After concluding our meeting at Doug's, and enjoying our usual feast that we refer to as "morning tea", we adjourned to Jean's place, a few minutes' drive away. On the way, one of our members had a close encounter of the porcine kind, when a bush pig broke cover and narrowly missed the front of the car.

Having safely arrived at Jean's we were able to see what a great job she has done with raised beds using gathered sticks and logs to make the edges. Jean composts shredded green waste, including weds, to enrich the soil. Her apple trees looked particularly impressive and the gardens that she has created on really poor soil are very productive and impressive.

Finally, we were reminded that any excess produce from our gardens can be dropped off at 3 Usshers Lane Goulburn. This facility prepares cooked meals for homeless and/or struggling families. Any spare produce could really help this facility continue its good work.
