# Windellama Celebrates its 200<sup>th</sup> Birthday

Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> March saw the culmination of months of planning and hard work for the celebration of Windellama's 200<sup>th</sup> birthday.

The Windellama area was discovered on 2 April 1818 by James Meehan, Hamilton Hume and others when they made their journey of discovery into the interior while trying to forge a pathway overland to Jervis bay.

Around 150 people, including local member Pru Goward gathered to see the unveiling of a large map of where the explorers travelled and camped on their journey. The map was unveiled by Mrs Thora Hush.

The new Country Fair Award to be known as the "Windellama Progress Association Award" is to be awarded to the exhibitor who has gained the most points from exhibiting at our Country Fair. Points awarded are on the basis of "First Prize 2 points" and "Second Prize 1 point". So the more classes you show entries in, the more chances of earning points.

This years' award was a contest between 3 exhibitors, Di Andrews 11 firsts and 11 seconds = 33 points first, Irene Turner 8 firsts and 11 seconds = 27 points second and Meredith Grant with 8 first and 7 seconds, = 23 points third.

The school canteen food must have been good, as the volunteers were kept busy.

It was great to see that after the Country Fair had ended, all the help received, when all the equipment etc., had to be packed away. I reckon without this help we would have been there what would have seemed forever. A great big thank you to all those who helped – THANK YOU.

As always, now that the Country fair is over the roses at our place are looking stunning, absolutely glorious.

Continuing on with the Fruit Fly saga, Yellow seems to be the main colour for attracting them as evident by the colour of all commercial made Fruit Fly Traps. I'm going to keep my eyes peeled for some yellow tape to wrap around my traps made. Also, yellow pressure spray paint cans contents sprayed onto the traps would possibly work. You can purchase male pheromone attracting refills at a reasonable price. All I need to do now is design a trap to fit them in. Apparently you only need one trap per orchard but me thinks, two or more will be better. The traps I made are working and give a good indication when this menace is about. Most stone fruit would be picked by now but don't give up on this fruit fly menace – keep the traps loaded and spray when needed.

This year we had a good crop of Gala Apples but unfortunately for us the Coddling Moth has enjoyed them as a host to lay their eggs in. So now I need to work on eliminating or reducing numbers of this pest. Yates Success Ultra is supposed to work but means continuous spraying.

## Staying Informed during a Fire.

Although the fire season is coming to an end, one of the notes from across the State was how to keep informed of any fires in the area.

The NSW RFS Fires Near Me app and website are the primary sources of information for the status of a fire. If the fire is sizeable, the RFS also posts Major Fire Updates with further information.

This picture shows each of the alert levels for a fire and the appropriate actions to be taken.

## Home Fire Safety

As the weather starts to get colder, here are a few tips on how to keep your home fire safe as you warm up.

If you have a fireplace in your home make sure the chimney is clean.

Check electric blankets for damage or frayed cords before placing on the bed.

Keep wet clothing at least 1 metre from heaters or fireplaces and never leave unattended.

## VEGETABLES ;-

Sow broad beans, unlike other beans, they prefer a cool climate to grow in and are ready to pick early spring. Before planting them, give the soil a good liming and also some complete fertilizer. They don't like high nitrogen fertilizer as this promotes leaves at the expense of flowers.

Other vegetables to plant are peas, cabbage and onions. Peas should be sown in two rows close to each other for support or grow on a fence which gets plenty of winter sunshine. Peas prefer a soil which has had a light dressing of lime and complete fertilizer.



## FLOWERS;-

Seedlings available now; Alyssum, Canterbury bells, carnation, cornflower, delphinium, dianthus, hollyhock, russel lupins, pansy, viola, primula, snapdragon, stocks and wallflower.



Sow sweet peas on St. Pats day, they prefer a soil containing compost, lime and complete fertilizer. They also row well in pots or hanging baskets.

This is the time to look around the local area and see which deciduous tree are showing the best colour. We have quite a few in our local towns putting on their autumn show.



Rake up any fallen leaves. Chop woody and leafy material well before adding it to the compost heap to assist the rapid breakdown that leads to good compost.

Plant spring-flowering bulbs. Daffodils, jonquil, along with crocus, hyacinth and tulip.

Tip prune native shrubs, such as grevillea and banksia to promote more flowers.

Sow borage seed for blue flowers for colour, and nectar for pollinators.

Move indoor plants into better light as days get shorter, but keep them away from indoor heating.

Transplant evergreen shrubs that are growing in the wrong place. As growth slows, they can be moved with more success.

Cut back herbaceous perennials to ground level as flowering comes to an end.

Stake sprawling perennials such as chrysanthemum.

Move frost-tender potted succulents into a frost-free spot.



# THE INNOCENT VICTIMS OF BARBED WIRE

Each year thousands of native animals face a cruel death or permanent injury from entanglement on barbed wire fences. It has been estimated that tens of millions of kilometres of fences now subdivide the Australian landscape, with sixty five percent of these having barbed wire as the top strand.

More than 75 wildlife species have been identified in Australia as occasional or regular victims of barbed wire fences. Most are nocturnal animals, both mammals (25 species) and birds (50 species). Gliding mammals such as the threatened Squirrel Glider and the Sugar Glider are particularly vulnerable. Flying-foxes and insectivorous microbats are also common victims, as are macropods – the wallabies and kangaroos. Nocturnal birds such as the insectivorous Tawny Frogmouth, as well as owls (some of which are listed as Threatened Species) are particularly vulnerable.

Many animals fail to see the fence or cannot clear the height under windy conditions. Most of those rescued are too severely damaged to return to the wild, as is the case with many animals rescued by WIRES. Some of the lucky ones are able to be returned to the wild after being in care, while others are not so fortunate and have to be euthanased.

The pain and suffering that they go through is illustrated in the accompanying pics of a Tawny Frogmouth and Greater Glider rescued off barbed wire by myself and my husband Dallas. Absolutely horrific I'm sure you will agree. Needless to say, both creatures had to be euthanased. (Photos taken after euthanasia, not whilst they were suffering).

## THE SOLUTION?

Obviously, the ideal solution would be to remove all barbed wire, everywhere, now! However, we all know that this is an impossible pipe dream and we have to work at informing people of the unintentional hazards of barbed wire and encourage them to gradually remove any barbed wire they have on their properties. It always has been, and always will be, a difficult and slow process. The use of barbed wire has been entrenched on our farms for generations and has always been part of our rural landscape - this won't be changed overnight. We must all, in our own small way, work towards having existing barbed wire removed, and discourage its use in new fencing. We must inform on the stock proof alternatives, so that there is an acceptable choice. ## PROOF THAT BARBED WIRE REMOVAL WORKS!

Back in 2009, Dallas and I were dismayed by having three Greater Gliders come to grief in the same section of fencing a couple of kilometres up the road from our place. With the farmer's consent we removed 200m of barb from what was obviously a regular 'glider path' for these amazing creatures. We still travel past the spot at least once a week, and since then there have been no further entanglements.

The Grand Champion fleece was this year won by Aaron Granger from Rogarra Stud and Vicki McMahon won the commercial breeders prize for the most points in the competition. Next year we will again have individual classes for commercial fleeces as well as stud entries. So all of you commercial wool growers please save some fleeces for our 61<sup>th</sup> Show. We had 24 entries this year which wasn't bad but we can do better if more of our larger woolgrowers can be coaxed into competing.

The Tug of War saw a record 6 teams compete in a round robin competition for the Hooky Memorial Trophy and \$1800 prize money. The Machonochie Monsters, formerly the Loose Screws, took out the grand prize of \$900 donating it to the Starlight Foundation (their anchor man was a sight to behold weighing in above 180 Kg), with the Baynham Family team 2<sup>nd</sup> (Starlight Foundation), the Loaded Dog (supplemented by a number of shearers, well done Roger) Team taking out 3<sup>rd</sup> prize and donating it to the preschool) and Taylor's Creek RFS 4<sup>th</sup> but also winning the RFS trophy from the ever consistent Tarago RFS coming 5<sup>th</sup>. The competition proved to be a great spectacle with the crowd egging on the competitors throughout the event with commentary from our newly found MC David the Skull. The kids tug of war was again very popular with 54 competitors aged 4 to 16 and everyone winning a prize. This year we again had the "Nail It Home" competition organized and run by Shane Harmer, with the open winner being Geoff Burns. Thanks to Goulburn Home Hardware for sponsoring this event.

This year's recycling event, the Recycled Bird Box competition, was won by Terry Dunn from Yours Truly (I lodged a protest but it fell on deaf ears). The event was sponsored by Goulburn Mulwaree Council

In the shearing competition, 24 Shearers competed for \$4500 in prize money, Johnny Cooper won the Novice;



# WINDELLAMA 200

Commemorating the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the discovery of the Windellama area on 2<sup>nd</sup> April 1818



**JAMES MEEHAN'S JOURNEY of DISCOVERY**

On 3 March 1818 a party made up of Charles Throsby, James Meehan, Joseph Wild and Hamilton Hume and others set out from Liverpool to try to find an overland route to Jervis Bay.


Numerous attempts were made to cross the Shoalhaven River but on 26 March the party divided. Throsby and some men retraced their steps and succeeded in crossing the river at Kangaroo Valley and made their way to Jervis Bay.

James Meehan's party pressed on into the interior and on 2 April 1818 they were the first Europeans to set foot on the Windellama area. They continued on and discovered Lake Bathurst before returning to Sydney.



We had a very successful day on the 18<sup>th</sup> March to Celebrate Windellama's Birthday.

We had visitors from Newcastle, Sydney, Wollongong, Canberra, Goulburn and we were very well supported by the locals from Windellama, Bungonia & Tarago, thank you to you all for your help and support.



## WILLOWGLEN GARDEN CLUBBERS March 2018 VISIT TO YARRALAW SPRINGS WINERY

The day dawned cool & overcast after overnight showers for our visit to Yarralaw Springs Winery. When we arrived we were warmly greeted by Danny & Viv who have built everything on this beautiful property themselves. They looked after us very well with coffee & tea and we enjoyed our morning tea followed by our members' catch up in our gardens. We were saddened to hear that one of Windellama community's legendary workers, Cathy Meehan, is seriously ill in Goulburn Hospital and also that Ron Wenban is in Canberra Hospital - we send our best wishes to you.

Wazza said that at Windellama Garden Club's invitation he had entered Willowglen Garden Club into the Country Fair with a selection of fruit & veggies from our members and we had WON the Champion ribbon - thanks to everyone who contributed, knowingly or otherwise (just a bit of fence hopping). Wazza is doing a horticultural course and was told you need to water & fertilise every 2 weeks but some long life pellets kill bees so check the label. Don't forget Bunnings do honour their guarantee if you return dead plants. Wazza brought 2 pots of pawpaw seedling for our members. Jude said their pears are doing really well, lots of tomatoes & corn, only a few pumpkins but they're still picking apples. Her bougainvillea is still alive and is reshooting.

Maria had dehydrated her tomatoes slowly in the oven and was pleased when Danny later showed us the simple solar dehydrator he made for Viv's prunes. Peter & Maria's fig tree seems to be suffering from a serious mineral deficiency in the soil but their pear tree is loaded. Peter H & Liz-Ann have just planted 6 oak trees grown from Braidwood Park & Tarago acorns. They also picked some large crabapples for jam from trees that never get any attention or water. Tony & Sandra brought what appears to be a new type of squash from their garden and also a large fruit on their flowering quince. Kevin & Margaret's purple beans are the best. Irene has had purple beans & zucchinis - she said she should weigh Lloyd to see how much produce she grew (and he ate in the garden). Her lemon tree is not dead - it's resprouting, yay!

Anne was disappointed that all her veggies died - from heat and possums (Anne drives from Canberra to Joy & Anna at Tallong for our meetings). Masses of wasps in ivy hedge from next door - tip: WD40 gums up their works. Joy has a bee with stripes & blue bum - it's a native bee. Curley's Poo (turkey & stable) from Penrose is best - put on top as compost - you can get it in

trailer or truck loads. Anna's grapes are looking good but she has lots of grasshoppers and her skinny corn probably needs water. Chuck said that a few of Carina's plants are still growing - good to hear. Our next meeting will be at Shirley Komnacki's, 69 Paddys Close, Lower Boro, where we will see her succulents & cactus collection growing.

### About Yarralaw Springs Winery and Attic Loft B&B:

Danny & Viv purchased 100 acres in the mid 1990's and have also added 6 dams to the original 2 dams. Danny explained the whole winemaking process: they currently harvest 4-1/2 tons of grapes and produce 6 varieties of wine: cabernet sauvignon, pinot noir, merlot, chardonnay, chenin blanc, riesling, and use American & French oak barrels. We learnt that egg whites are used to filter red wines (tannins are protein) and milk to filter white wines - everything natural. Danny let us look into the vats of pinot and chardonnay (just harvested) bubbling away but he stood by to make sure no-one fell in (unfortunately). After we sobered up from that heady experience Danny & Viv showed us around their house orchard ( peaches, pears, apples, plums, quinces & even table grapes) and their gardens - with the solar dehydrator, chooks and structure built to house native bees.

Then Danny led us to one of the vineyards not yet harvested and we ducked under the nets (birds used to eat everything until the nets were put on) and tasted them - full of flavour. No pesticides or insecticides are used in the vineyards so it's all natural. When originally planning the vineyard in the late 1990's, Danny & Viv decided to use red ironbark posts for trellis support instead of the usual (& cheaper) CCA/creosote treated pine posts to ensure the vineyards, grapes and wine are all carcinogen free. Overhead sprinklers are used to fight frosts (luckily no frost so we didn't get wet). Danny & Viv built the wine cellar & cellar door using huge, strong natural hardwoods, lots of insulation, & a cheery potbelly stove in winter, although it remains a constant pleasant temperature all year round, as does the beautiful self-contained 2 bedroom Vine Loft B&B with great views above the wine cellar door - a perfect holiday location.

We were all extremely impressed with everything Danny & Viv have achieved from all their hard work. Thank you both sincerely for hosting our Garden Club and for your warm hospitality. What a great day we had, which will long be remembered. We encourage everyone, locals & visitors alike, to experience this wonderful attraction in our very own community.
